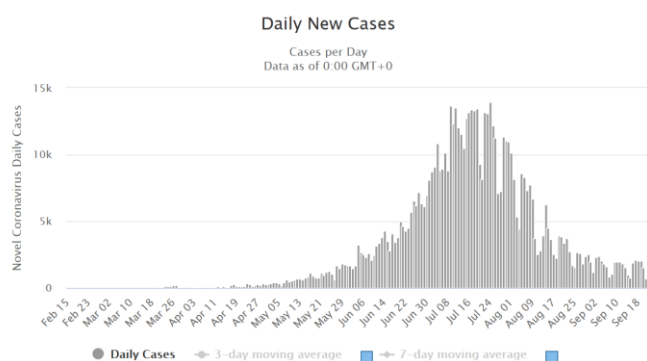

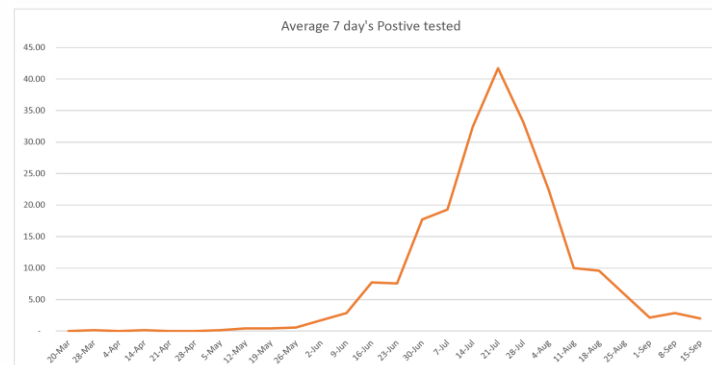
What happens now?



Daily New Cases in South Africa



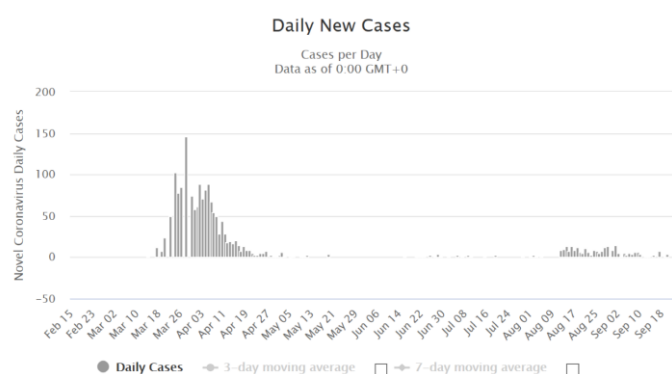
- In 6 weeks SA daily new infections increased from 304 on 1 May to 2112 on 9 June (694% increase).
- In the 6 weeks from 9 June SA daily new infections increased from 2112 to 13944 on 24 July (660% increase).
- In 8 weeks from 24 July the SA daily new infections decreased from 13944 to 2029 on 19 September (85% decrease).



- Platinum Health has followed a similar trend as SA. Both South Africa and Platinum Health have done well to contain the spread of the disease.
- Important to note that 1.1% of SA population has been infected by COVID-19 compared to Platinum Health 5.1%. Therefore Platinum Health infection rate is 5 times higher than SA.

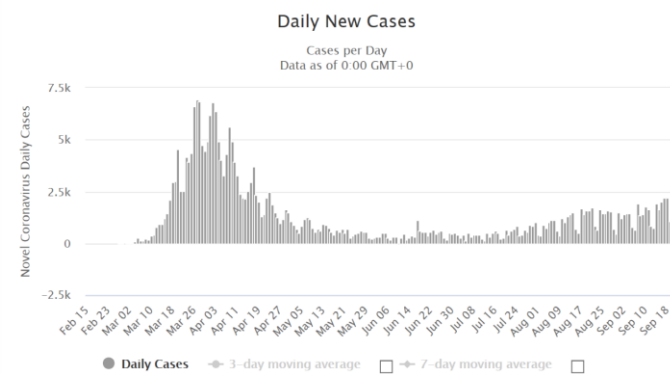
THEY GOT IT RIGHT:

Daily New Cases in New Zealand



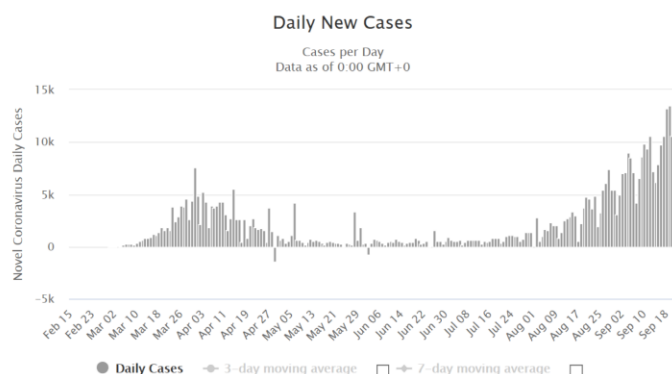
- New Zealand acted swiftly and have almost eradicated COVID-19.
- Although Germany has seen an increase in COVID-19 infections, the daily infections are still well below 0.002% of population.

Daily New Cases in Germany



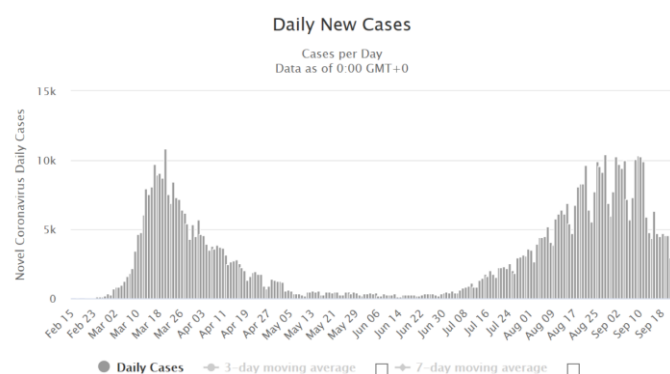
THEY GOT IT PARTIALLY RIGHT BUT NOW FACE "SECOND WAVE":

Daily New Cases in France



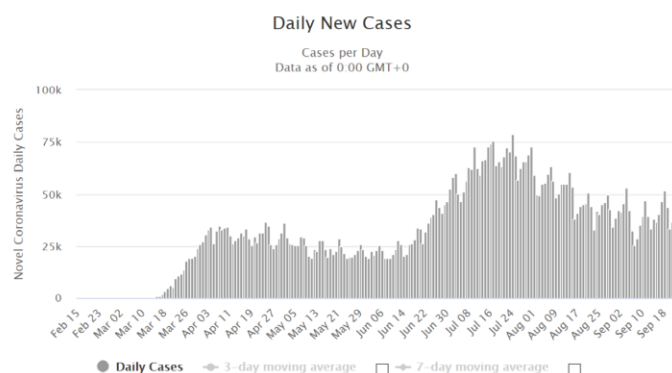
- France and Spain are experiencing a "second wave" of COVID-19 infections. The "second wave" is larger than the first wave which is a huge concern.
- Most countries are experiencing a "second wave" of COVID-19 infections.

Daily New Cases in Spain



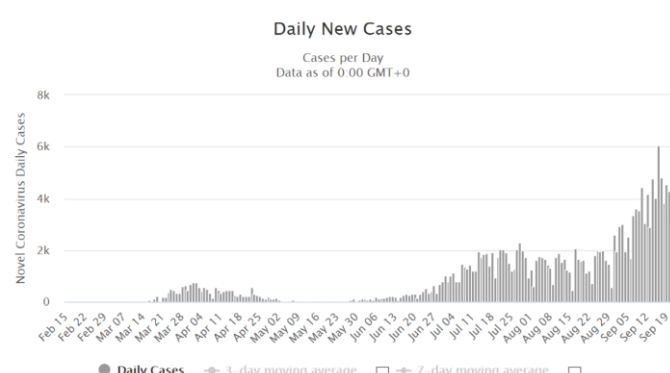
THEY GOT IT WRONG AND MOVED DIRECTLY FROM "FIRST WAVE" INTO "SECOND WAVE":

- America (USA) moved directly from a "first wave" to a "second wave" which was far more devastating than the "first wave".
- Israel initially did well after the "first wave" but have moved into a "second and now third wave" of COVID-19 infections. They are the first country to experience a "third wave".

WHERE TO NOW FOR SOUTH AFRICA?
